1. be well prepared in all academic disciplines, and are skilled in reading, writing, speaking, listening, and thinking.
2. be proficient in mathematics and science.
3. have a knowledge and understanding of people, events, and movements in history (including church history) and the cultures of other peoples and places.
4. be exposed to literature and the arts and understand how they express and shape their beliefs and values.
5. have a knowledge of languages and cultures of other peoples, dispelling prejudice, promoting interethnic harmony, and biblical hospitality for the “alien” or “stranger.”
6. personally respond to carrying out the Great Commission locally and around the world in a culturally sensitive manner.
7. utilize resources including technology to find, analyze, and evaluate information.
8. pursue lifelong growth and development.
9. demonstrate critical thinking skills by questioning, analyzing, evaluating, solving problems, and making wise decisions.
10. demonstrate the worth of every human being as created in the image of God.
11. be able to articulate and defend their Biblical worldview while having a basic understanding of opposing worldviews.
12. understand and commit to a personal relationship with Jesus Christ.
13. know, understand, and apply God’s Word in daily life.
14. be empowered by the Holy Spirit and pursue a life of faith, goodness, knowledge, self-control, perseverance, godliness, brotherly kindness, and love.
15. treat their bodies as the temple of the Holy Spirit.
16. be actively involved in a church community, serving God and others.
17. understand, value, and engage in appropriate social (community) and civic (political) activities.
18. embrace and practice justice, mercy, and peacemaking in family and society.
19. value intellectual inquiry and are engaged in the open honest exchange of ideas.
